

# CITY OF CANTON 2018 CAPER

The Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report, or CAPER, summarizes the City's accomplishments achieved through the use of entitlement funds allocated from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The reporting period for the annual CAPER is April 1 - March 31.

## State Recognition

### President's Award for Innovative Practices

The Early Childhood Resource Center received the Ohio Conference of Community Development (OCCD) President's Award for Innovative Practices.

OCCD is a 175+ member statewide association of community and economic development organizations, which helps develop, implement and improve federal, state and local programs since 1965.

The City of Canton awarded the Early Childhood Resource Center \$40,000 in Community Development Block Grant funds for a year-long program that helped Canton residents start their own family child care businesses.

The program, which began in August 2018, paved a career path for the participants while increasing the amount of high-quality child care that is available in the Southeast and Northeast areas of Canton.



## Program Compliance & HUD Requirements


A minimum of 70% of Funding must benefit low- and moderate-income populations  
**The City is at 82.54%**

Program cannot expend more than 20% of its annual allocation on planning administration  
**The City is at 16.41%**

Program cannot expend more than 15% of its annual allocation on public service projects  
**The City is at 6.71%**

Program cannot have more than 1.5x its annual allocation on its line of credit on February 1st  
**The City is at 1.1.**

## 2018 Program Expenditures



The City of Canton is an entitlement jurisdiction that receives federal funds from HUD to support local community development and affordable housing activities.

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) fund is used to fund a variety of programs benefitting low- and moderate-income residents ranging from infrastructure improvements to homeowner rehabilitation programs, furniture assistance, public services, and fair housing initiatives.

The HOME Investment Partnerships Program funds are used to provide loans and grants to owners of rental property and to non-profit community housing development organizations for acquisition, rehabilitation, and the construction of affordable housing units.

The Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds are used for essential services related to emergency shelter, operation of emergency shelters, and homelessness prevention services.
